"To the church in Hatfield"


How many of us as kids cut a magnet into smaller and smaller pieces trying to discover a magnet that only had a positive or negative pole? Do you remember trying to move as quickly as you could after cutting the magnet in the hopes you would find that elusive monopole before it had a chance to change back to a normal magnet? And do you remember never being successful?

Well, some extremely intelligent people grew-up and never relented in the search for the monopole, the single pole magnet. These extremely intelligent people became theoretical particle physicists. In their mathematical hieroglyphics, they argued that in the earliest fractions of moments after the Big Bang there would have been plentiful monopoles created. Since not one has ever been discovered, they had to go back to their mathematical hieroglyphics and figure out why.

Alan Guth is a professor at MIT. He postulated a theory called *Inflation*. He argues that an instant's instant after the Big Bang the universe exploded in expansion – hence *Inflation*. This helps explain why the universe looks so similar wherever we look.

He proposes that there are vast regions of the universe that after Inflation are forever isolated – us

from them us – because travelling even



and them from information at the speed of

light cannot catch up with the universe's expansion. Even though these regions are unseen, they are not unknowable because the universe is similar throughout. The whole is seen in the particular.

I share this little anecdote this month (to show that science and religion do not have to be at odds with each other) to help explain a truth we hold that the local church contains the fullness of church.

It was quite apropos that on the Sunday of our Annual Congregational meeting the suggested reading was from Paul's opening salutation in 1 Corinthians.

Later writings attributed to Paul (They're referred to as Deutero-Pauline letters.), such as Colossians and Ephesians, speak of the church as the mystical Body of Christ, all being united through the headship of Jesus. But the whole is also found in the particular.

Earlier writings, such as the opening passage from 1 Corinthians, dwell on the church as its local, more concrete expression: "To the church of God that is [that just happens to be] in Corinth ..." (1:2) This is the ecclesiology (the theological study of the church) reflected in the Communion cup that was presented to our church in 1814 by the Billings fam-

denomination. It reflects this early Christian, Congregational and UCC ecclesiology that the entirety of church, its entire spiritual calling and charism, are manifest in the local congregation.

The local church does not define or limit the Body of Christ any more than one part of the universe restricts any other. Rather, just as with the cosmic inflation example, the local signifies the whole. What is found locally is due to the fact that it is inherent universally.

This ecclesiology is empowering and uplifting. It promises that what we do here, what we do personally, is done as and for the universal church. And it promises that all the gifts and authority of the Spirit are shared generously with us. Our motto is "God is still speaking," but also God is still acting through us as local Christians and church.

It is this same ecclesiology that manifests itself in the UCC's centuries long embrace of the biblical doctrine of *covenant* (the remainder of 1 Corinthians 1:2). Covenant is a binding relationship among parties. It is a mutually agreed upon respect among the covenant partners. Each part of the whole supports the other. Or, in the imagery Paul used, we are together the parts of the one body of Christ.

We never want to forget or minimize that we are church. Bills will need to be paid, volunteers will need to be found, but in our home at 41 Main Street, it is Jesus who leads and strengthens us. Jesus is among us to comfort and to inspire. Trust in this and see what awaits. Church is not limited by us because church is so much more than us.
