Ordinary Blessings in a Season of Extraordinary Blessing

It was a beautiful Spring-like Sunday afternoon in February so Sharon and I took our dog for a walk around South Deerfield. A lot of other people had the same idea. We ran into people we hadn't had the chance to talk with for quite a while. The dog was not all that happy with the frequent stops, but we eventually finished our lap.

One of our first encounters was with a friend who owns a bookstore in town. He and his wife have an eclectic group of friends. It makes sense since they were always trying to build community in small, personal ways.

I remember once when they opened an art space in town. Out in front of the property they landscaped an area for people who were walking by to just sit down and talk with one another.

This is sort of how I ran into my old friend on this sunny February afternoon. He was sitting on a bench out in front of his home with a friend. This is when he pointed across the street to the Colonial era cemetery.

His wife had passed recently. She worked with the town Historical Society. In her memory, the group placed a granite bench in the cemetery. In a fitting tribute, they honoured her by giving people a place to sit down and spend time with one another.

My friend also introduced me to his friend, the one who was sitting with him on the bench in the sun. He's a retired archaeology professor. He's now volunteering with Deerfield's Historical Society.

He had learned that I am a pastor in Hatfield. Hatfield and Deerfield shared a common border in the days before Whately was incorporated. In the Colonial period, settlers moved north up the Connecticut River from Connecticut, and Deerfield for the longest time was the settlement located farthest to the north in our river valley.

From him I learned that an old Native American trial that was also used by the Colonists, that connected what is now Old Deerfield with Hatfield, passed along what is now Mill Village Road in Deerfield. As I sit typing this newsletter article, I am looking out at Mill Village Road.

The route I take between home and church has been traveled by Native Americans and Colonists for

hundreds of years. I like the thought of being so close to this trail and the history of this place and its peoples. It reminds me that the way I see things now is not the way they have always been or will be. My perspective is but a snapshot of a much larger picture. This helps to keep one openminded.


I mention these random and pleasant encounters because today, February 25th, the Federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention announced that Americans should brace for the likelihood that the coronavirus will spread to communities in the United States. It is no longer a question of *if* this will happen, but of *when*.

I assume the next important question is how bad will it be? As of today, it is reported that the coronavirus has infected nearly 80,000 people in 37 countries, causing at least 2,600 deaths. Who knows how this will play out in our backyard? Will we be obligated or choose to be more isolated from our neighbours? Will we look at each other differently and see encounters with others as dangerous?

These are not idle questions any longer. The pragmatic investors in the stock market are taking note of what could happen. Yesterday the Dow dropped 1,000 points and right now it is down another 800.

I do not want to be a pessimist or alarmist, hopefully this is only a hypothetical example, but how-

Maybe a constructive Lenten discipline would be to offer thanks to God for overlooked blessings. Maybe it could open our eyes to new perspectives like my now seeing ordinary Mill Village Road differently. And then maybe this would make us more open to the extraordinary blessing offered to all by a crucified Saviour. And this, God willing, we can do together as the blessing of our church community. May Lent give us the chance to see differently.

Lent is the 40-day period of spiritual preparation culminating in the mysteries of the Last Supper, Jesus' crucifixion and His death, and anticipating the wondrous mystery of His resurrection. Its 40-day duration is based

on Jesus' 40 days in the desert. Jesus is grapple with the implications of His God. He struggles with the meaning and revelation. During Lent, we are asked to deeper into our spiritual calling as opportunities to meditate upon the Him. It is hoped that these 40 days will
